

THE FOUNDING

In 1977, incoming Senate President Phil Lewis (above left) approached Mark Hollis (above right), then Vice President of Publix Super Markets, about the business community coming to the Legislature to seek

increases in consumer taxes rather than finding ways to hold the line on spending. The challenge "rang a bell" and the idea for a state government watchdog was born.

An organizational meeting convened in Tampa two years later resulted in the formation of the Citizens Council for Budget Research, which five years later was renamed Florida TaxWatch. The founders were Winn-Dixie Chairman J.E. Davis, T. Wayne Davis, Publix Super Markets founder George Jenkins and President Mark Hollis, Senator Phil Lewis, and Senator Ken Plante.

The founders' vision was to create a citizen-funded, independent public guardian to monitor how taxpayers' money is spent, root out government waste and inefficiency, and serve as a catalyst for positive change while balancing the interests of business, labor, government and

all taxpayers. They sought to implement their vision by focusing on how the organization could best make independent, research-driven recommendations to encourage state government to be more competitive, productive, and accountable.

They understood that spending government tax dollars more wisely means taxes will not have to be raised as steeply or as often, and could even be reduced, while improving the quality and positive impact of essential government services. Now, four decades later, the founders' vision to improve taxpayer value, citizen understanding, and government accountability endures.

Over the past four decades, Florida TaxWatch has become one of the most respected independent government watchdog groups in the country. Florida's Governors, Cabinet officers, lawmakers, agency heads and state employees listen closely to what TaxWatch has to say in its research reports. TaxWatch recommendations help to shape state laws, constitutional amendments, budgets, and new programs. An unrelenting pursuit of better government is the key to TaxWatch's success.

TAXWATCH 2019 RESEARCH HIGHLIGHTS

For Florida TaxWatch in 2019, the focus was largely on health care and education policy, two of Florida's most critical policy areas, and a continued focus on protecting Florida taxpayers from unnecessary and onerous taxes.

This year, we again published our highly successful pocket guides How Florida Compares: Taxes and the Taxpayers' Guide to the Florida State Budget, and the How Florida Counties Compare pocket guide will arrive in December of 2019. In addition, our education research and activities provided what may be the most meaningful impact any organization can hope to achieve: transforming the lives of children who are most in need.

We also continued to beat the drum for a solution to the "E-Fairness" issue, which has been a consistent part of TaxWatch research for nearly two decades. With the recent US Supreme Court decision in the *Wayfair* case, Florida stands on the edge of being able to pass meaningful legislation to enforce the collection of sales tax from online sellers, rather than making thousands of ordinary Floridians unwittingly break the law by not reporting and remitting the taxes themselves.

Once TaxWatch gets focused on an issue like E-Fairness, we will continue to pursue its resolution until the job is done, regardless of how long it takes, which demonstrates our dedication to protecting taxpayers all across the state.

Florida TaxWatch research touches nearly every corner of public policy. Reports in 2019, for example, promoted the use of incentives to bring Florida's film and television in line with neighboring Georgia (whose incentives portfolio has allowed the industry to put down deep and stable roots in the state), examined the potential use of Independent Medical Review to reform the state's workers' compensation system (which is facing a potential crisis if the economy takes a downturn), and pressed the Legislature on the importance of putting the "trust" back in the affordable housing trust funds (as opposed to the all-too-common practice of sweeping the housing trust funds to pay for other programs).

Florida TaxWatch focused on a number of areas this year, and the following represents the highlights of that work. For a more complete list of our research in 2019, please see the Selected Research section in the back of this Annual Report.

HEALTH CARE & AGING POLICY

Both Floridians facing chronic conditions and those facing just a simple flu bug or strep throat got a boost this year from Florida TaxWatch research in the healthcare arena, as reports were released showing the benefits of palliative care providing the right care at the right time to improve a patient's life, and showing the potential convenience and costsavings of point-of-care testing, which would allow pharmacists to diagnose and treat these common ailments without patients needing to visit their primary doctor's office. The point-of-care report was done at the request of state Representative Rene Plasencia, who sponsored legislation on the issue in

Additionally, there are few more pressing policy issues than the provision and funding of high-quality medical care for Florida's rapidly expanding senior demographic.

Florida's aging population is growing rapidly. While Florida's overall population is expected to grow by almost 5.1 million between 2010 and 2030, elder Floridians will account for most of Florida's population growth, representing 55.2 percent of the gains in population.

As Florida's population continues to age, the elderly population will require vastly different and more costly forms of health care, such as long-term care

for chronic conditions, more frequent examinations and follow-ups, and services and care for cognitive and mental impairments. A TaxWatch report on the Program of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (known as PACE) examined how PACE offers Florida's seniors high-quality care without the costs of hospice and other expensive alternatives.

CITIZENSHIP INSTITUTE

This year saw the graduation of the fourth class of the Florida Citizenship Institute, a multi-phase leadership training program focused on Florida's young business leaders. The Institute focuses on preparing the participants to engage with local and state government in an informed, effective manner.

Through hands-on workshops with current and former agency leaders, legislators, and the close involvement of Governor Bob Martinez and other high-profile TaxWatch volunteer leaders, graduates gain an understanding of the intricacies of the process and structure of government that were previously available only to those working in the process.

TaxWatch Board of Trustees members have the first opportunity to nominate participants for the Institute each year, and we assure you, your up-and-coming leaders will find the program highly worthwhile.

TRANSFORMATIONAL LEADERSHIP

Now in its seventh year, the TaxWatch Principal Leadership Awards (PLA) Program continues to be one of the highlights of each year at Florida TaxWatch.

The PLA Program annually identifies Florida's most effective principals in high-risk K-12 public schools, recognizes and rewards their work, and promotes their transformational practices throughout the state by identifying the actions and approaches that have made the difference. The goal of the program is to improve student performance in high-risk schools, thereby closing the achievement gap.

In 2019, through a continued partnership with the Florida Prepaid College Foundation, the program continued the Academic A+ Scholarship Program, awarding one two-year prepaid scholarship to a student in each of our winning principals' schools.

The students eligible for the scholarship are nominated by the winning principals, and are required to meet several criteria designed to ensure that a two-year scholarship would be a life-changing event for them. This year, we met more students whose success to this point is nothing short of remarkable, and we are excited to see what comes next for each and every one of them.

Each of the scholarship students experiences significant obstacles to academic success. Of all of

the programs and initiatives in which Florida

TaxWatch is involved, the Academic A+ Scholarship

Program may be the single most rewarding and
genuinely transformational.

Thanks to the work of TaxWatch and our generous members and sponsors, students desperately in need will have access to the kind of educational opportunities that so many of us are able to take for granted.

EDUCATION POLICY

In addition to recognizing the state's best principals, TaxWatch research continues to make a difference in the educational policy space generally. This year saw TaxWatch take a deep dive into the true cost of educating a public school student, showing that when you consider the entirety of public spending per-student, the cost is close to \$11,000 per student, rather than the roughly \$7,300 per-student spending reported by the legislature.

We also examined the return on investment for taxpayers from the Florida College System, following Governor DeSantis signing an Executive Order establishing the goal to make Florida number 1 in the U.S. for workforce education by 2030 and to ensure that Florida students are ready for high-demand, high-wage jobs.

The Florida College System (FCS) is the primary access point to undergraduate education for more than 800,000 Floridians, including approximately 63





percent of recent high school graduates and returning adult students. Nearly all (99 percent) of FCS students come from within Florida, and FCS institutions provide a wide range of classes and programs to fit the busy schedules of its students, who are often caring for dependents and working full time.

The return-on-investment for these institutions is significant, and our report shows that Florida has the 10th lowest 2-year in-state tuition cost in the nation, the 3rd lowest 4-year in-state tuition cost, and that Florida taxpayers receive a return of \$10.80-\$15.42 for each dollar invested in the FCS, as well as 10,000 new jobs as a result of the higher lifetime earnings of FCS graduates.

THE BUDGET & BUDGET TURKEYS

Grounded in nearly four decades of expertise in the state's budgeting process, TaxWatch continued the monthly series of Budget Watch publications, as well as possibly our most widely-known publication, the Budget Turkey Watch Report. The "Turkeys" were released again this year, reinforcing the role of TaxWatch as the watchdog for spending projects that did not receive the proper amount of public scrutiny.

The only organization in the nation that releases such a report, the Budget Turkey Watch report takes TaxWatch staff months to develop, has saved the taxpayers billions over nearly four decades, and has ruffled more than a few partisan feathers.

fellow committee members to support their proposals, and ultimately convincing the entire group to sign off on a final budget. Were you able to keep your commitments to your voters?



TAXWATCH WORKS TO #MAKEFLCOUNT

TaxWatch, along with elected leaders from the City of Tallahassee, Leon County, the City of Tampa, the City of Orlando and Orange County highlighted the need for community participation in the 2020 Census in news conferences throughout the state in 2019.

As the third largest and fourth fastest growing state in the country, the upcoming Federal Census count will be more important to the Sunshine State than nearly any other state. Federal grant programs distribute \$700 billion using census data nationwide.

If Florida is under-represented by the count, it could cost the state millions, or even billions, of dollars. Florida's state and local officials need to immediately start ensuring the accuracy of the count by

participating in existing intergovernmental processes to verify addresses and residences.

A recent Florida TaxWatch report shows that Florida receives fewer grants per capita than every other state in the nation and concludes, "It would be hard to argue that Florida's share is anywhere close to equitable." If Florida received the national average in per capita federal grants, the state would get \$14.6 billion more of its tax money back.

Florida had the fourth largest undercount (200,670 persons) during the 2000 Census. At Florida's per capita grant amount, this undercount would cost the state more than \$225 million annually, or more than \$2 billion over a decade.







A proposed constitutional amendment initiative that would de-structure Florida's energy market may appear on the November 2020 general election ballot that would (if approved) radically change Florida's energy market. This independent analysis estimates the financial impacts of deregulation on tax revenues and to help Florida taxpayers better understand the effects of the proposed deregulation.



The non-collection of sales taxes on purchases by Florida customers by remote (out-of-state) sellers has been the most significant tax compliance and collection issue facing Florida and other states for many years. Remote vendors sell products by the internet, telephone, and mail. Historically, the courts have held that when a remote seller makes a sale to a person in a state in which the seller does not have a physical presence, that state cannot require the seller to collect the sales tax due and remit it to the state. This report, and a companion piece about E-Fairness in the legislature at the time, outline a path forward for policymakers.
